

## Poreword

On April 12th, 1892, there opened at 237 Fifth Avenue the first commercial gallery to be devoted exclusively to the furtherance of American art.

The founder, William Macbeth, came from Deland in 1871 at the suggestion of an older brother who preceded him to the United States some years previously, and soon after entered the employ of Frederick Keppel who became the leading authority in the field of rare prints. Later he became a partner in the firm of Frederick Keppel & Company.

Though dealing in prints, Mr. Macbeth developed a keen interest in what the contemporary American painters were doing, following their work individually and visiting exhibitions wherever and whenever he could.

He was personally acquainted with many of these artists, and finding their work stimulating, decided that it was high time a gallery was started in which pictures by American artists only would be exhibited and sold. Having made many friends among the print collectors of that day and also collectors of European pictures, he sought their counsel on his plan. The majority opinion violently opposed the venture. "There is no American art worthwhile", "American art does not measure up to contemporary European painting", "William, if you go ahead with this foolish idea of yours, it will mean suicide", and so on. But William Macbeth had faith and a vision. He just knew he was right. Beside this he had a certain Irish stubbornness that urged him on, no matter what.

Eighteen-ninety-two was a bad year economically. There was only a very small capital back of the gallery. There was no American art worthwhile! Days were dark, indeed, but the little gallery weathered the storm, and its founder lived not only to reap the rewards of his conviction, but to see American art firmly established, and even occasionally to receive a mite of praise from across the seas!

William Macbeth died in 1917, and his son Robert took over the management with the same interest and enthusiasm so characteristic of his father. In 1940 he, too, passed on only two years before this anniversary, an event to which he had looked forward with pleasurable anticipation.
