Since Rembrandt and Da Vinci experimented with the monotype, many painters have toyed with this fascinating medium. Few, however, have recognized or fully probed its possibilities.

This is a strange thing, since the monotype is a medium which embodies in itself a sheer virtuosity for exploitation by a painter. The particular qualities of painting, — tone, form, light and shade, subtlety, atmosphere, — can be achieved through it. Every nuance possible to black and white can be conveyed by it.

The monotype has the additional interest of being a distinctly individual piece of work, — one proof only being made from the glass plate.

Mr. Hoffman has devoted the last five years to perfecting his control of the ink, and the delicate manipulation required in proofing.

He was a student at the Pennsylvania Academy of the Fine Arts, in Philadelphia, during the years 1914 to 1920. He studied under Charles Grafly, Daniel Garber, and Henry McCarter.
