FOREWORD

FOR several seasons the pictures by Leith-Ross have stood out among their companions on the walls of the big exhibitions. There has been something about them that set them apart from the general run even of those having more or less the same inspiration of subjects.

In the present National Academy exhibition, for instance, as one stands at the entrance to the Vanderbilt Gallery and looks across at the north wall, Leith-Ross's canvas is an immediate center of interest, and that in the presence of a number of more imposing, more "striking" canvases.

It is this quality that has led us to follow his work rather closely in recent years; each succeeding example has only served to strengthen our growing impression that he is a man with something to say and with an individual way of saying it.
