What we look for in the work of younger painters is promise rather than fulfillment. Sometimes it is hard to persuade a painter in his early thirties that the work he shows us is but the first step toward ultimate achievement. Occasionally it is necessary to remind them that Inness in his forties was painting what are now known as very early examples, negligible except as stepping stones in his development; and that even our own George Bellows, had he lived, would probably have developed far beyond the splendid canvases that represent him today.

In this exhibition we show the work of four of the younger men who, from our point of view, show qualities that make them appear worth while. They are among several interesting young painters who have come to us in the past year. We like their point of view; we like their respect for the traditions that they have respectively followed; and we shall be glad if the encouragement that should come to them from this showing, will spur them on to the future that we believe is in store for them.

Born, Westfield, N. J., 1900. Art interest began while studying chemical engineering at Princeton. During vacations, studied in Life classes at N. Y. School of Fine and Applied Art. 
