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FOREWORD

F PRESENT plans materialize, this will probably be our last Annual Exhibition of Thirty Paintings by Thirty Artists. This particular type of exhibition grew out of the need, at least once a year, to show together the work of a number of our best painters, most of whom were seen regularly here and elsewhere in the special one-man shows which have followed one another at two or three-week intervals for many years.

It is our belief that the showing of many pictures by one man has outlived its usefulness, except in rare instances. Gallery visitors, particularly those spending only a few days in New York, want to see the work of as many men as possible during their brief visits. In a gallery like ours, we believe that they will find greater interest in a well-selected group of paintings by a considerable number of men, than in a one-man exhibition of fifteen or more

canvases.

Commencing next fall we hope to carry this plan into effect. We shall have a permanent catalogue, listing the men whose work is to be found here, with a brief biographical note of each. The pictures in the gallery will be typical works by twenty to thirty of these men, and the hanging of individual examples will be changed as new things of special interest reach us. The pictures will be numbered to correspond with the numbers opposite each artist's name in the catalogue; when the title has some special significance it will appear on a tablet on the frame.

Other examples by the men listed will be available for inspection at any time in our Private Room, so that the new plan will combine the advantages of the one-man show and the general exhibition.

Whether this will work to the benefit of all concerned, remains to be seen, and we may have to revert to the old established custom. We are, however, resolved to try the new idea for at least one season, and we believe that it will meet with approval.


