Abstract Francis Henry Taylor was the fifth director of The Metropolitan Museum

of Art, serving from 1940 to 1955. Taylor led the Museum through World War II and the beginning of America's involvement in the Cold War, as well as a \$9 million renovation of the Museum's exhibition space and organizational restructuring. During his tenure the Museum tripled membership, doubled its endowment, and attendance figures rose dramatically. Taylor is highly regarded for his efforts to strengthen the Museum's educational programming and public outreach, and led the formation of the Department of Education and Museum Extension. Taylor was committed to expanding audiences through radio, television, and off-site art exhibitions. His oversight of an ambitious program of loan exhibitions enabled thousands of Museum visitors to view masterworks from European collections. The records include correspondence, meeting minutes, reports, memoranda, architectural drawings, and ephemera.

Biographical note

Francis Henry Taylor (1903-1957) was born in Philadelphia, PA, the youngest of five children of Dr. William Johnson Taylor, a surgeon and former president of the College of Physicians, and socialite Emily Buckley Newbold. Taylor graduated from the University of Pennsylvania in 1924 and traveled to France where he taught English at the Lycée de Chartres from 1924 to 1925. The following year he enrolled at the Sorbonne, where he first met the medievalist art historian Henri Focillon, with whom he maintained a lifelong friendship.

Taylor returned to the United States for graduate studies at Princeton University, then traveled to Europe as a Carnegie Fellow during 1926-1927. In 1928 he married Pamela Coyne and left Princeton prior to obtaining his degree to become Assistant Curator of Medieval Art at the Philadelphia Museum of Art under the directorship of Fiske Kimball. There Taylor edited several museum publications, inagurated school education programs, helped to fill gaps in the collection, served as the first curator of the Philadelphia Museum of Art's Rodin Museum, and coordinated a major installation of medieval art.

In 1931 Taylor was appointed Director of the Worcester Museum of Art, where he emphasized educational outreach as he had in Philadelphia and envisioned the museum as a community center. One of his first accomplishments was to screen foreign films and documentaries at the museum in the evenings. Taylor established an art education program for school children, placed articles, history books, and scholarly materials in galleries, and opened departmental reading rooms where visitors could handle unique objects and consult academic publications. Taylor was an early pioneer of special exhibitions that enticed new patrons into the art museum, and in the nine years of his administration the number of annual visitors increased from one-hundred thousand to one-hundred forty-seven thousand.

On January 8, 1940, the Trustees of The Metropolitan Museum of Art elected Taylor the institution's fifth Director. When he arrived, parts of the Museum building were in need of repair, and attendance and membership numbers were in decline. Among Taylor's first actions were the removal of turnstiles at the Museum entrance and the institution of a free admission policy. In 1941 he consolidated the Museum's various teaching programs into Departments of Education and Museum Extension. Taylor met the challenges presented by America's entry into World War II by coordinating the shipment of over fifteen-thousand of the Museum's most valuable works of art to safe storage at Whitemarsh Hall, near Philadelphia. To attract visitors while operating with limited staff and resources during wartime, Taylor mounted successful temporary exhibitions and a series of concerts of Music Forgotten and Remembered curated by Emmanuel Winternitz, keeper of the Crosby Brown Collection of Musical Instruments. During these events, musicians played restored instruments for which Renaissance and Baroque music had been originally written. The Metropolitan Museum became a place

of relaxation and refuge during the war years. As Taylor stated, "We preserve in our galleries the very things which the Nazis have destroyed and for which we are fighting."

In 1943, plans were announced to construct a new Museum wing to exhibit the collections of American painting and sculpture owned by both The Metropolitan Museum of Art and the Whitney Museum of American Art. New York City Parks Commissioner Robert Moses informed the Museum that the City of New York would pay for no more than fifty percent of new building costs, however, which complicated plans for a coalition. The idea was abandoned in 1948.

During the spring of 1944 Taylor worked with the U.S. State Department to initiate a series of exhibitions in American museums featuring artworks loaned from European institutions and that could not yet return to their home institutions because of difficult post-war conditions. The series included "French Tapestries" (1947), "Paintings from the Berlin Museums" (1948), "Van Gogh: Paintings and Drawings" (1949), and "Art Treasures from the Vienna Collections" (1950). In 1944 the Museum also launched a program of circulating exhibitions that traveled to academic, vocational, and junior high schools of New York City. The exhibitions were comprised of unique objects and included supplementary teaching materials. More than sixty-seven exhibitions to area schools were facilitated under Taylor's directorship.

In its 1954 *Annual Report* the Museum announced "the end of the reconstruction program in the central part of our building. We now have 135 reconstructed galleries in which our collections of European paintings, medieval art, and Western European decorative arts are regularly exhibited." The galleries allowed visitors to view the collection in a more historical sequence of selectively edited objects, and featured new electrical wiring, improved lighting and ventilation, and temperature and humidity control. The new Grace Rainey Rogers Auditorium featured stage facilities that permitted a full symphony orchestra, and projection capabilities for films and educational programs.

Following five years of planning and two years of construction, The Metropolitan Museum of Art unveiled the new Junior Museum in October 1957. Originally established in 1941 by Taylor, the new sixteen-thousand square foot facility was four times larger than its predecessor and marked one of Taylor's last great accomplishments.

The Metropolitan Museum of Art was shocked by Taylor's resignation in 1954. Confessing that his health was the greatest factor in his decision, he announced plans to reprise his role as Director of the Worcester Museum of Art. In June 1955, the Museum regretfully accepted Taylor's resignation and elected him Director Emeritus and Special Consultant to the Board. Taylor died on November 22, 1957, following kidney surgery.

1903 - Born Philadelphia, PA.

1924 - Graduated from the University of Pennsylvania.

1924-1925 - Taught English at the Lycée de Chartres. Introduced to art historian Henri Focillon.

- 1925-1927 Enrolled in the Graduate School of Princeton with the intention of obtaining his doctoral degree.
- 1926-1927 Returned to Europe as a Carnegie Fellow.
- 1927 Appointed Assistant Curator at the Philadelphia Museum of Art. Left Princeton before completing his degree.
- 1928 Married Pamela Coyne.
- 1931 Appointed Director of the Worcester Museum of Art.
- 1940 Appointed the fifth Director of the Metropolitan Museum of Art at age thirty-seven, the youngest Director up to that time. Commissioned Robert B. O'Connor to draft a report on the architecture of the Museum.
- 1941 Established the Department of Education and Museum Extension and the Junior Museum. Explored use of radio and television to forward Museum education. On December 11th, four days after the Japanese attacks on Pearl Harbor, the Museum announced plans to close at dusk, to appoint armed officers to sleep in the building, to implement Red Cross employee training, and to limit telephone usage.
- 1942 Museum evacuated fifteen thousand of its most valuable works of art to Whitemarsh Hall, the former estate of Edward T. Stotesbury, located twelve miles northwest of downtown Philadelphia.
- 1944 Served overseas as a representative and organizer of the American Commission for the Protection of Artistic and Historic Monuments in War Areas in London and Paris. Museum artworks were recalled from Whitemarsh Hall and Bank of Manhattan Company vaults. Spring opening of the renovated painting galleries attended by Princess Juliana of the Netherlands. The Museum furnished circulating exhibitions to academic, vocational and junior high schools of New York City.
- 1945 Published Babel's Tower: The Dilemma of The Modern Museum.
- 1947 The Metropolitan Museum of Art, The Museum of Modern Art, and the Whitney Museum formed agreement to loan artworks to one another, as well as consult each other regarding acquisitions.
- 1948 *The Taste of Angels: A History of Art Collecting from Rameses to Napoleon* published. The Whitney Museum of American Art announced its plans not to move forward with a coalition with The Metropolitan Museum of Art.
- 1950 Due to the Korean War, Metropolitan Museum began its second evacuation of art to the Colorado Springs Fine Arts Center and Irving Trust Company. Annual attendance passed two million, more than doubling the 1940 figure when Taylor became Director of the Museum.
- 1953 Metropolitan Museum terminated its agreement with Colorado Springs Fine Arts Center and evacuated artworks were returned to the Museum. Loan agreement between

The Metropolitan Museum of Art, The Museum of Modern Art, and Whitney Museum of American was terminated.

1954 - Museum entered into agreement with New York University to create and produce educational programs for television. Museum opened 135 new and reconstructed galleries following a \$9 million renovation. Published *Fifty Centuries of Art*. Resigned from the museum December 13th and announced his re-appointment as Director of the Worcester Museum of Art.

1955 - Named Director Emeritus and Special Consultant to the Board of The Metropolitan Museum of Art; returns to Worcester Museum of Art as Director.

1957 - Published *Pierpont Morgan as Collector and Patron*. Died on November 22nd.

Scope and Content

The records contain correspondence, meeting minutes, reports, architectural drawings, and ephemera documenting Francis Henry Taylor's activities as Director of The Metropolitan Museum of Art from 1940 to 1955. The majority of the correspondence is professional in nature and concerns Taylor's role as liaison between the Museum and other museum directors primarily in the United States, the Museum's staff and trustees, government agencies, educators, and arts and civic organizations. There is significant material related to the renovation and reorganization of the Museum, educational programs, emergency preparedness, as well as Taylor's involvement in the International Council of Museums (ICOM), his role as mentor to smaller American institutions, and engagements with various educational, government, and charitable organizations.

The collection does not contain all records produced by Taylor's office during the period of his Directorship; significant portions of his correspondence -- especially concerning exhibitions, acquisitions, finances, the Board of Trustees and other administrative matters -- were interfiled in the Office of the Secretary Records, also held by the Museum Archives.

The records are arranged in three series: I. Correspondence; II. Emergency Evacuation, Protection and Storage; III. Reports.

Scope and Content

Taylor's correspondence provides a detailed view of the substantial reorganization and renovation of the Museum that he implemented. Also highlighted are innovative exhibition and educational programs, Taylor's relationship with New York City Parks Commissioner Robert Moses, and his interest in new technology including television and radio. Other prominient topics include war-time preparedness, art evacuations, charitable campaigns, and Taylor's influential role in the greater arts community on a local, national and international level.

Arrangement note

The correspondence is arranged alphabetically by subject or personal name. At the beginning of each letter run single documents have been grouped together by initial of subject or personal name. Some files contain documents in Italian, French, German and Spanish.
